Size: Landscape/Horizontal Format 8.5"High x 11" Wide (NO EXCEPTIONS)

Deadline to Submit: Received no later than February 28, 2027

Poster Requirements: The back side of the artwork must include the student's name, grade, school name, teacher's name and contact email or phone number of the parent or guardian. **Upon request we will provide cardstock.**

Notification & Prices: Winners will be notified by March 30, 2027 and will receive their prizes **on May 15th, 2027** at the **DH Firewise 7th Annual Don't Get Burned Wildfire Safety Event at Mortimer Farms**. The event is free and students' Families, Teachers, School Officials, and Friends are invited. Prizes will be handed out at 12:00 pm.

SUGGESTED LESSON PLAN

Create Interest and Focus Activity:

Show wildfire photos and/or video and possibly ask a firefighter to talk.

Needed Supplies:

8.5"High x 11" Wide Paper, Crayons, colored pencils, watercolor paint, markers, etc. as available.

Entries must be Landscape/Horizontal Format Only. **D-H Firewise will supply cardstock upon request.**

Ask Questions to Get Students Engaged such as:

- **What is a wildfire?** *A wildfire is an uncontrolled fire in forests, grasslands, and other ecosystems.*
- **What Images did we see in the wildfire photos/video?** *Examples are: Flames; smoke; trees; brush; firefighters; fire trucks; planes, helicopters; bulldozers, embers; burning homes; concerned people; scared animals; evacuation sites; blackened landscapes; gray ashes; damage; danger; courage; determination; bravery*
- **What causes most wildfires?** *Intentional and unintentional actions by people, and lightening. Unintentional actions include campfires, burning rubbish, smoldering cigarettes, playing with matches, equipment and bullet sparks, structure fires, and malfunctions. Dragging trailer chains.*
- **How can you make your home safer?** *Clear fuel (vegetation and trash) around the house. Talk to your parents about using fire resistant building material; have and know how to use fire extinguishers. Know how to call 9-1-1. Don't play with fire. Plan ahead. Understand Survivable space and The Home Ignition Zone.*
- **How can you prepare for the wildfire?** *Share what you learn in school about wildfires with your family. Prepare a Disaster Kit for everyone in the family. Talk to your parents about making a to-do list in case you must evacuate. In case you're not together when you're home is evacuated, establish a family meeting place. Know how to contact your parents if you are separated. Know how to prepare your pets to evacuate. Be prepared so that you don't panic*
- **What happens to animals within a wildfire?** *They try to escape or hide. Have a plan in place for them*
- **Why is it good to know how to protect yourself and your family, pets, farm animals, and house before a wild-fire happens?** *You will feel safer, if we all are prepared. You will help make the entire community safer.*

SUGGESTED LESSON PLAN:

Discuss prevention and Danger Messages—Students may use them verbatim or for an idea.

- * Fire prevention is everyone's job
- * Stay aware of the latest news and updates from local media and fire department
- * Clear away flammable material 5 ft from buildings, thin vegetation 30 ft from buildings
- * Have fire extinguishers nearby, and know how to use them
- * Small wildfires can become giant wildfires fires very fast
- * Get out quick before the smoke gets thick
- * If ordered to evacuate, close doors and windows
- * Obey local laws regarding open fires
- * Prepare to evacuate with supplies in the car
- * Evacuate when told by first responders
- * If a wildfire is near, leave as early as possible
- * Have an emergency kit ready
- * Always have a safe escape plan. Have 2 ways out

What interesting things happen during and after a wildfire?

Fires can create fire tornados-Wildfires can travel over 8.5 miles per hour-Wildfire embers can travel more then 1 mile-Lack of natural vegetation can cause flash floods-Temperatures of a wildfire can burn hot enough to melt steel and glass
